The method we are using is simple. We will not use names, just numbers in the tally. Take the Federal Post Offices of New York book, look up your favorite county, have a sheet of paper at hand. The headings will look like this:

and so on until 1969.

Of course, very few counties will have entries in the 1790s. But this is just a sample of the accounting.

When a post office is <u>established</u>, we mean began operation - by that name - regarless of the fact it may have existed by another name or by the same name in another county. What we want is the date it was opened in YOUR county.

Because it is necessary that we all use the same method, all data begins Jan. 1 in any year and ends December 31.

If a post office name changes, it is recorded as a plus and a minus in the same year, no net change in the number of offices operating. If an office is discontinued in one county because of a new county being formed, it is listed in the old county as discontinued and in the new county as established. It would be a plus in the new county and a minus in the old, but no net change to the state total.

Emma Koberg reports she first put the name, year established and year discontinued on a file card, then sorted the cards by year of opening. Emma reports this makes the listing very easy. de Lisle reported he just took a lot of paper with the years listed, then worked from the book without any intermediate step.
